## Summertime... and the Livin' Isn't Always Easy

*Poverty calls us to sow hope.... Poverty is the flesh of the poor Jesus, in that child who is hungry,  
... in those unjust social structures. -Pope Francis, Meeting with Students of Jesuit Schools*

Summer vacation ought to be a time of joy and adventure for children. For children living poverty, however, summer brings its own set of stresses and hardships. During summer vacation poor children no longer have access to free school breakfast and lunch programs, and are at risk for hunger and malnutrition. Low-wage parents have to figure out appropriate child care, which can be prohibitively expensive. Otherwise children can be left on their own for many hours in environments that are not always safe or healthy. Without adequate adult supervision and educational activities, children can experience "academic backsliding", losing some of the skills and knowledge they gained during the academic year, making future academic success harder to achieve.

This summer, Bishop Matano, the Priests' Council and the Diocesan Public Policy Committee are asking parishioners to learn more about the realities of children in poverty. Learning some of the startling statistics on this issue is one place to start:

- **Over half** of the children in the city of Rochester live in poverty.
- In every county of our 12-county diocese, child poverty rates are in the **double digits**.
- According to UNICEF, the United States ranks **26th out of 29** among wealthy countries in overall child well-being.

These figures should make our jaws drop.

Then they should spur us to take action, to work toward insuring the God-given dignity of these precious little ones.
