PRAYERS AND ACTION FOR MOTHER EARTH



At the end of this month, leaders from around the world will gather in Paris for the 21st Session of the Conference Of the Parties to the United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change. This COP21 gathering is responsible for developing an international agreement, applicable to all countries, to keep the average global temperature increase to below 2 degrees Celsius (3.6 degrees Fahrenheit).

That might not sound like a lot, but scientific research has found that to be a crucially important threshold. If the planet heats up more than that, the white ice and snow of the polar regions will melt into black water and brown ground which no longer reflect the sun's heat, but instead absorb it. This will accelerate global warming, even to a point of no return. It's been compared to speeding along a curving mountain road; there comes a point where we'll simply be going too fast to avoid careening over the precipice.

However there is hope! Millions of people are demanding that their leaders take courageous action in Paris to reduce the greenhouse gas emissions that are causing the planet to heat up. The Catholic Bishops Conferences from **every continent** have signed a letter stating:

We join the Holy Father in pleading for a major break-through in Paris, for a comprehensive and transformational agreement supported by all based on principles of solidarity, justice and participation. This **agreement must put the common good ahead of national interests.** It is essential too that the negotiations result in **an enforceable agreement** that protects our common home and all its inhabitants. http://catholicclimatemovement.global/wp-content/uploads/2015/10/APPEAL-TO-COP-21engl-final-1.pdf
