

The historic overturning of *Roe v. Wade* ushers in a new era in our mission to protect the dignity of human life at all stages. Let's reflect on how we can increase our efforts to make our state and our country more welcoming for expectant women and their babies, and then take action.

We must remember that this is a judicial victory, not a cultural one. The culture remains deeply divided on the issue, which will be evidenced by the patchwork of state statutes pertaining to abortion across the country. To change the culture and build a culture of life, we need to enact family-friendly policies that welcome children, support mothers, cherish families and empower them to thrive...

Building a culture of life is not solely the responsibility of the government or those heroic individuals working on the front lines, in crisis pregnancy centers and other ministries. All of us need to respect the dignity and sanctity of human life in everything we do: in how we treat our children, spouses and parents; in the way we behave in our place of work; in sum, how we live Jesus' two great commandments to love God and love our neighbor. Love, charity and reverence for human life from the moment of conception through natural death - these will build and sustain a culture of life.

Millions of Americans have worked tirelessly for almost 50 years towards this outcome. We thank them with every fiber of our being. Their vital work continues, and we commit ourselves to it.

This legislation, supported by our Diocesan Public Policy Committee, places a **two-year moratorium** on **crypto-mining operations** housed in fossil-fuel burning power plants. This process uses an **enormous** amount of electricity and dumps heated water into waterways.
