In the fall 2013 'Gleanings from the Vineyard', we listed 18 different ministries as representative of what pastoral associates and ministers are thought to do as part of their job. When we asked you to check off ministries and add others not listed that you *actually* do, the list grew to 85! (Under 10 main umbrellas of pastoral care, faith formation, outreach etc.). Some activities were a surprise: "manage IT issues", "carry out background checks", "coordinate community garden" ... What becomes apparent is that every parish has its unique needs. Each pastoral associate and minister comes with his or her own set of skills, gifts and aspirations. The combination of the two leads to new ministries tailored to the person, the parish and the location. This list only reinforces what parishes already know: pastoral associates and ministers are people of God on a mission. They are dedicated, creative and serve with tireless energy and practical love.

What do we do with this list? How can it be helpful? The Executive Committee decided to make a pamphlet out of these to

show the breadth of responsibility pastoral associates and ministers carry, as well as appreciation for the variety of ministries in the different parishes. The Committee also hopes this list can serve as a point of connection for the purpose of sharing our gifts with one another. For example, a parish who has experience with social media might be able to work with a parish that needs help in this area. Or if you are beginning an RCIA team and aren't sure where to start, you can contact Cathy Kamp, Pastoral Associate at St. Joseph's in Penfield, who would love to lead a workshop for your team. Ecumenical Good Friday Cross Walk

In 2008 Bishop Singh, who was the new Episcopal Bishop at the time, became concerned about the amount of violence in our city and brought up the idea of a walk to the Greater Rochester Community of Churches Board. He desired a show of unified Christian concern. Marv Mich who was then president of the GRCC board put out a general invitation for organizers. I was one of many who answered that call. That first initiative developed into a Stations of the Cross Walk with Churches from all over Monroe County standing in prayer at locations where violence had occurred that year. Other prayer stops were added to lift up the social agencies and neighborhood organizations that have worked tirelessly to bring healing and hope to the affected populations. The youth from many groups are invited to carry the Cross from one stop to the next and Christian leaders from the city and suburbs the city take turns leading the group in prayer.

Starting in 2013 under the leadership of Rev. Alan Dailey, new President of GRCC-Faith in Action Network, we have adopted the Seven Last Words of Jesus as the framework of the Walk as this tradition is more familiar to a wider array of Churches. With the assistance of Rev. Wilfredo Baez we added prayers in Spanish. Recently we have partnered with Rev. Lewis Stewart of the newly formed United Christian Leadership Ministry with the result of more participation from the Black Church pastors. It has been a well forged relationship that will bring even more diversity to our prayer.

This is the REAL thing, Christianity in action, prayer at its fullest. I have been an organizational member of this planning group for the past 7 years. We choose a different site each year, identify areas that need prayer, contact social agencies in the area and enlist writers and speakers. It has been a labor of love

as my eyes are opened anew to the challenges faced by those who live in urban poverty.

I know you are all very busy during Holy Week but I encourage you to invite your parishioners to try this walk as part of their Good Friday

Lenten experience. If you would like to be involved with the planning efforts and become a member of the organizational team I would be glad to speak with you further. It will change your heart and revitalize your prayer. Sue

2015 Ecumenical Good Friday Cross Walk - April 3rd 9:00am

The purpose of the walk is to “make holy” through prayer and recognition, the place where there has been violence, and to lift up in thankfulness those community groups bringing hope and healing through their work. We will reflect on the Seven Last Words of Jesus as we walk the mile and a half route through the Lyell-Otis Street neighborhood. This area of the city has been the scene of several homicides and the challenges of poverty pervade its streets. Won’t you come and walk with us in solidarity with those who pray for the Kingdom of God to come to their neighborhood. We will gather at Holy Apostles Church at 530 Lyell Ave. 14606 at 9:00am to begin the walk.

The privilege of ministry

As someone who has been in ministry for 33 years, I have been recently doing much reminiscing as I begin to contemplate retirement. As a boy growing up in West Warwick, R.I., I of course became a passionate Red Sox fan. It became obvious early on that my aptitude for the social sciences far exceeded my other abilities. I went to Providence College and then studied for the priesthood here in Rochester at St. Bernard's Seminary. I decided not to continue on for priesthood and met Donna, my wife of 30 years.

The focus of my ministry for the first 20 years was faith formation and the last thirteen years spent as a Pastoral Associate. I can only say that it has been a journey of many highs, lows and ordinary moments. The people I've met have allowed me to minister to them and more importantly, have also ministered to me. The relationships I've formed over the years are dear and lasting.

The moments and memories I cherish all start from the fact that without my faith, none of this would have been possible. When I watched the surgery of the 5 year old girl battling brain cancer, and forever remembering the

Raggedy Ann doll she was holding, my imperfect faith said "Why?"

When I sat with the young woman who was wailing her grief in the hospital because her father and two brothers were murdered in a house fire, I could only give her a hug. Then I took a long drive down Lake Rd as I did often when confronted with the mystery of my faith.

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The joyous moments were easy. The multiple times seeing parents and kids celebrate the joy of First Communion, Confirmation. The wonderful memories of the ecstasy in the eyes of new parents having their precious bundle baptized with their family, community surrounding them. When I sat with anxious parents in Golisano Children's Hospital and watched as they received the news

that their baby was going to be o.k. When I sat quietly with folks who came to accept that they weren't going to get better and that God loved them. The memories of all the good times had with the various staffs I've worked with and all the laughs shared.

I am a very lucky man. I've had the privilege to be with remarkable, talented, faith-filled people who believe, in spite of what life has dished out to them. When I first started, I was concerned that since I'm very emotional, this would somehow get in the way of my ministry. In order to be involved in ministry, one's family has to understand and forgive. I have been blessed beyond reason with a great wife, family, friends and colleagues.
