10 Schools Receive Middle States Accreditation

DISTINCTION IS INDICATION OF EDUCATIONAL QUALITY AND ON-GOING IMPROVEMENT

Ten Catholic schools in the Diocese of Rochester were notified in 2008 that they have received accreditation from the Middle States Commission on Elementary Schools (MSCES). Before receiving accreditation, the schools were required to undergo a more than two-year process involving numerous site visits and interviews with faculty, parents and students from each school. Nine of the schools were notified in December, while St. Mary, Canandaigua received their accreditation in the spring of 2008.

The following schools have received Middle States accreditation:

Leach, who also added that several more schools are currently working on receiving their accreditation. “This recognition is an affirmation of the quality education that is available at all of our schools.”

Accreditation signifies that these schools have met the MSCES standards for a quality school, including a rigorous process for developing self-knowledge and an on-going strategic plan for school improvement.

Catholic Schools Week Focuses on Service to the Community



Catholic Schools Week, a joint project of the National Catholic Educational Association (NCEA) and the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops, is being celebrated nationally from Jan. 25-31. This year's theme focuses on community service.

"Service to the community is a hallmark of a Catholic education," said Anne Willkens Leach, superintendent of Catholic schools in the Diocese of Rochester. "We are very proud of all of our students, faculty and staff who participate in service projects throughout the year." (You can see glimpses of these projects on the pages of this newsletter.)

Schools throughout the Diocese typically celebrate Catholic Schools Week with Masses, open houses and activities for students, administrators, faculty, school staff, the community and families.

The 2009 theme links to a recently completed NCEA initiative, "Birthday Blessings for Pope Benedict." During the pope's April 2008 visit to the United States, Catholic youth were asked to pledge hours of community service to honor the pope's 81st birthday. More than 2 million hours of service were pledged by the end of the campaign. Three Catholic school students representing Catholic youth nationwide had the opportunity to deliver the pledged hours personally to Pope Benedict during a private moment at the Vatican Embassy, where the pope stayed during his Washington, D.C., visit.
