## "War never again! Never again war!"

"War never again! Never again war! ... There are so many conflicts in this world which cause me great suffering and worry, but in these days my heart is deeply wounded in particular by what is happening in Syria and anguished by the dramatic developments which are looming.....I repeat forcefully: it is neither a culture of confrontation nor a culture of conflict which builds harmony within and between peoples, but rather a culture of encounter and a culture of dialogue; this is the only way to peace." -Pope Francis



"We have heard the urgent calls of our Holy Father, Pope Francis, and our suffering brother bishops of the venerable and ancient Christian Churches of the Middle East. As one, **they beg the international community** *not* **to resort to military intervention in Syria.** They have made it clear that **a military attack will be counterproductive**, will exacerbate an already deadly situation, and will have unintended negative consequences.

Instead of employing armed force, our nation should work with the international community and direct all of its considerable diplomatic capabilities to initiate dialogue and negotiation."

"First, I would like to say that we welcome the President's decision to postpone Congressional consideration of a resolution to authorized military action. It is critical that recent international proposals to secure and destroy Syria's chemical weapons get serious attention, evaluation and encouragement. As Pope Francis has said repeatedly, **dia-logue** and **negotiation** are the paths to peace, **not military attacks and arms shipments.** 

Despite this positive development our [U.S. Catholic Bishops] Conference, in union with the whole Church, remains deeply concerned that the possibility of military action remains on the table. [In his speech] the President said he sees "modest effort and risk" in a limited U.S. led attack. Instead, the Church sees a grave range of "unintended negative consequences."

With Pope Francis we believe pursuit of a military solution is "futile" and will distract from serious diplomatic and political solutions. Our bottom line is that we call upon our nation and the international community to press not just for a resolution of the question of chemical weapons, but to work for serious dialogue to end the conflict, to refrain from fueling further violence with military attacks or arms transfers, and to offer more humanitarian assistance.
