In his recent Apostolic Exhortation entitled *Evangelii Gaudium* ("The Joy of the Gospel"), Pope Francis writes: "The great danger in today's world, pervaded as it is by consumerism, is the desolation and anguish born of a complacent yet covetous heart, the feverish pursuit of frivolous pleasures, and a blunted conscience. Whenever our interior life becomes caught up in its own interests and concerns, there is no longer room for others, no place for the poor. The culture of prosperity deadens us; we are thrilled if the market offers us something new to purchase. In the meantime all those lives stunted for lack of opportunity seem a mere spectacle; they fail to move us."



It is not wrong to want to live better; what is wrong is a style of life which is presumed to be better when it is directed towards 'having' rather than 'being', and which wants to have more, not in order to <u>be</u> more but in order to spend life in enjoyment as an end in itself.

It is therefore necessary to create life-styles in which the quest for truth, beauty, goodness and communion with others for the sake of common growth are the factors which determine consumer choices, savings and investments.

We feel powerless and distant in the face of the overwhelming suffering in the world and the poverty statistics in our own state, yet we think the newest smart phone will "empower" us.

The rush to BUY -BUY -BUY can turn the holy waiting of Advent into nothing more than the "holiday shopping season." The celebration of the Incarnation of God-Made-Flesh is reduced to fistfights over plasma televisions sold by clerks making poverty wages in Big Box stores. What could be less joyous?

We can do better than this, as individuals, as a society, as the Church. We do not have to be deadened, as Pope Francis wisely describes it, by self-centered, pointless acquisition, particularly at this time of year. The Holy Father reminds us that through Christ we are "set free from sin, sorrow, inner emptiness and loneliness." This should not only make us joyful, it should inspire us to create a world that includes everyone in that joy.

2) **Spend Less**—Buy one less gadget, fewer plastic gizmos, all those things your loved ones don't need and won't remember.

3) **Give more**– Give homemade gifts and gifts that encourage spending time together; See page 2 for ideas on spending money in ways that increase, not diminish, joy and justice in the world.

4) **Love All**–Donate the money you save to Catholic Charities or other efforts supporting poor and vulnerable people; Spend time with lonely, elderly and bereaved folks; Make that call to your Representative in support of immigration reform; Register for the March for Life bus to Washington DC; Sign a petition against sweatshops.... Find new ways to bring Christ's joy to the world.
