The Hardest Job in the World: Supporting Parents for the Good of Us All

Throughout our diocese, Catholic Charities agencies support families through material and financial aid, and also through emotional guidance and mentoring. This help includes parenting skills training and information on nutrition and developmental needs of children. Catholic Charities staff provide parents whose children have been placed under protective services the opportunity to see and interact with their children during supervised visits. Other programs coach parents in making the difficult life changes necessary so they can live up to their responsibilities and be reunited with their children.

It is hard work helping parents who may never have had good role models themselves, but strengthening families is imperative to strengthening our society.

This year, our Diocesan Public Policy Committee is focusing our advocacy efforts on supporting two NY State-funded programs that empower parents in tackling "the hardest job in the world."

Healthy Families makes home visits to parents even before the birth of the child which can continue until the child enters Head Start or kindergarten. Through this program, parents learn about labor and delivery, nutrition, family activities that promote child development and other aspects of raising safe, healthy children. Healthy Families has been proven to reduce by 50% the number of low birthweight babies. Children in the program are less likely to repeat a grade and or to score below average on a standardized vocabulary test. Mothers with prior involvement in child protective services were much less likely to be physically abusive after participating in Healthy Families. Catholic Charities in Steuben County runs the Healthy Families program for that area, and other agencies provide the service in five other counties in our diocese.

The **Maternity and Early Childhood Foundation** funds programs across the State for low income expectant and new parents, with a special focus on teens. In our diocese, MECF had funded a Birthright pregnancy care center and several parenting programs run by Catholic Charities and other agencies which included counseling, prenatal health information and transportation to appointments. Unfortunately MECF's budget was slashed by 75% in recent years, and it hasn't been able to maintain this level of support. Our voices can change this!

On February 8 & 9 in our parishes across the diocese, Catholics will be asked to sign petitions urging New York State officials to invest greater funds in these programs. Please ensure that your parish is gathering signatures and encourage people to speak out on behalf of these programs and the families they strengthen!
